MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



What a year it has been. Our hearts go out to all of those who have suffered through the COVID-19 pandemic. We hope we've been able to help by encouraging folks to enjoy the San Dieguito River Valley. Getting some exercise outside is good for the mind and body.

As an added plus, exploring the outdoors lets you learn about the biodiverse region that we call home.

That biodiversity is thriving on 117 acres overlooking Lake Hodges that we purchased this year. Acquiring the pristine coastal sage scrub habitat was made

possible with state and federal grants and, most importantly, by \$367,000 contributed by more than 2,000 generous donors.

On the restoration front, this year we have ripped out invasive species and planted native plants with the help of the Urban Corps of San Diego County, California Native Plant Society and other volunteers. Despite the pandemic, we organized restoration projects in Gonzalez Canyon, River Path Del Mar, San Pasqual Valley, Rancho Santa Fe and elsewhere.

The education component of our mission continues to reach people of all ages. Pollinator's Paradise, Next to Nature, Exploring our Sense of Place and Watershed Explorers combine varying degrees of experiences in the field with classroom or online elements. Many of our Watershed Explorers are kids from the inner city. All of our education programs share a common goal - connecting people with nature.

One of the best ways to make that connection is by having fun. Our recreation program is stronger than ever and is anchored by the ever-popular Coast to Crest Trail Challenge. This year, more than 400 people completed the five-hike challenge to earn their prize.

Also this year, the Coast to Crest Trail itself grew one mile closer to completion, with 49 of 71 miles now open. Thanks to a \$1.5 million grant secured by the River Park, plans are progressing to build a critical trail connection and bridge over the river in Fairbanks Ranch. Within the next few years, we will be able to hike uninterrupted from the coast to the San Pasqual Valley.

None of our programming would be possible without our great partnerships, starting with that of the San Dieguito River Park Joint Powers Authority. New collaborations include working with the Green Infrastructure Consortium and Lumbercycle to develop an inventory of nature-based solution projects within the San Dieguito watershed. A \$50,000 grant from the San Diego Foundation is funding those initiatives.

On the Conservancy's Board of Directors, it is my great pleasure to serve with such talented, experienced, and hardworking colleagues. I'm honored to be chosen by them to represent the Conservancy.

With your help, our partners at the River Park are laying plans for another bridge to nature — this one to span the river in Osuna Valley. A feasibility study presents three possible bridge types: Prefabricated steel truss, precast concrete bulb-tee girder and recycled railcar. The bridge will provide a final linkage to complete 31 contiguous miles of the Coast to Crest Trail from Del Mar all the way to San Pasqual Valley.

CONSERVATION

Del Dios Land Acquisitions

With your help, the San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy now holds title to 117 acres of habitat overlooking Lake Hodges. Escrow closed in early 2021. Supporters were generous and swift, donating nearly \$347,000 in just three months to retire the Conservancy's share of the purchase price. Special thanks go to sellers Stuart and Jeanie Donelson for making a \$50,000 price reduction.







Restoration Projects

This year, we have fought the battle against invasive plant species on three fronts. We are revegetating riparian corridors after hauling out great volumes of giant reeds and salt cedar at Lusardi Creek, Rancho Santa Fe, Fairbanks Ranch and San Pasqual Valley. As camera-trap photos have shown, restoration projects improve habitat function. They also improve the hydrology of rivers and creeks and reduce wildfire risks.


